In addition, three (3) awards will now be conferred for each of the following award categories:**

- A. Municipal Construction Projects
(Full-time or Part-time Municipal Engineer)
- B. Municipal Construction Projects – Populations under 20,000
(Consultant appointed as Municipal Engineer)
- C. Municipal Construction Projects – Populations 20,000 and above
(Consultant appointed as Municipal Engineer)
- D. Municipal Parks/Recreation Projects
(Full-time, Part-time Engineer or Consultant)
- E. Municipal Management Projects
(Full-time, Part-time Engineer or Consultant)
- F. Municipal Construction Management Projects
(Full-time, Part-time Engineer or Consultant)
- G. Municipal Projects Involving Intergovernmental Cooperation
(Full-time, Part-time Engineer or Consultant)

On behalf of the Society, we encourage you to prepare an entry for this, our 34th annual awards program. Application Instructions and Guidelines are enclosed and entries are due to be completed no later than September 16th.

A panel of judges will be selected to review the entries and recommend awards. An awards presentation ceremony will be held on November 16th, 2011, at the Society's Annual Meeting Luncheon which is held in conjunction with the 96th Annual League of Municipalities Conference in Atlantic City.
